- 1. In "Proof of an external world", Moore claims that he does not need to prove his premises in order to prove that there are external things. Why does he think so? Is he right about this? Why or why not?
- 2. Why does Stroud believe that "The consequences of accepting Descartes's conclusion as it is meant to be understood are truly disastrous. There is no easy way of accommodating oneself to its profound negative implications." ?

 Is Stroud right about this? Why or why not?
- 3. According to Stroud, "if somebody knows something, p, he must know the falsity of all those things incompatible with his knowing that p (or perhaps all those things he knows to be incompatible with his knowing that p.)" (29-30) Explain what Stroud means. An example will help. What is Stroud's argument for this claim? What do you think? Should we accept this claim or not?
- 4. Stroud discusses an example about a man being in Cleveland. What is the purpose of this example? Does this example show what Stroud thinks it shows? Why or why not?
- 5. In the *Meno*, Socrates tries to explain why knowledge is better than mere true belief (true belief which is not knowledge). What is Socrates's explanation? Is this explanation correct? Why or why not?
- 6. Is one of these two states better than the other?
